

Taylor Duerr, Age 33, Detroit, MI.

I grew up the youngest of three boys to two loving parents. I started boxing when I was 10 years old and amassed a record of 32-1 as an amateur and had a very bright future. I started experimenting with drugs at the age of 9 when my friends and I found weed on the street. I gradually progressed to using harder and harder drugs throughout middle school and high school. When I was 15, I quit boxing and started doing more and more drugs. I did heroin for the first time when I was 16. Later that year, I was expelled and went to juvenile. I was sent to rehab at 17, and moved to Ann Arbor, MI where I've lived the last 15 years and have been sober 14 of those years. I started boxing again in 2016 and quickly turned pro. In 3 years, I won state and national titles and currently have a record of 11W-1L-2D. I have a 12 year old daughter named Taya, and she is my everything. I currently have 2 years of sobriety and am an active member in Alcoholics Anonymous.



Tim Rabolt is a Technical Expert Lead (TEL) at JBS International, joining the team in August of 2021. Previously, Tim served as the Executive Director for the Association of Recovery in Higher Education (ARHE), leading the organization's efforts to support students in recovery from addiction through the expansion of collegiate recovery programs. Tim's primary knowledge base is around recovery support services and the recovery field in general. He has been in recovery since April of 2011, during his senior year of high school in Wilmington, DE. Tim founded the collegiate recovery program at The George Washington University in Washington, D.C. where he completed his Bachelors in Business Administration and his Masters of Arts in Education and Human Development. He previously interned in the Recovery Branch at the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy before working full-time as a Project Manager at Altarum- a public health research and consulting firm in the Washington, D.C. area. He currently serves on the Eau Claire County Opioid Task Force, the Advisory Board for the Cardinal Recovery Program at Stanford University, and the Board of Directors for the nonprofit Students Recover.

Fighting Childhood Hunger

The mission of Angels of Action is to provide children and their families access to food, essential needs and community resources with love, respect & understanding. The vision is empowering the community through dedication and compassion; equipping children and families to thrive.

Angels of Action runs The HUB (Helping, Uniting, Bridging) -- Families can utilize this program for help with basic necessities (food/hygiene/clothing), navigation of homelessness & housing needs, goal setting & achievement, referrals to other resources and organizations, etc. The HUB is a 3-fold program with the initiative to reduce barriers that families face when seeking support in times of need. The HUB staff are a guiding hand for families in need to help receive assistance in resource connections and referrals in the community. Their goal is to direct families to services that meet their needs. Sometimes the missing piece is a phone call from one organization to another, showing that the family is taking the steps necessary to help themselves. Building Relationships and following up is an important focus of the HUB. They encourage and support families through the process of receiving help; building trust that is vital to be able to identify and address the underlying needs of the family.



Community Mental Health for Central Michigan (CMHCM) provides mental health, intellectual/developmental disability, or substance use disorder services to eligible residents of Clare, Gladwin, Isabella, Mecosta, Midland, and Osceola counties. Anyone in Michigan who has Medicaid, or who qualifies for Medicaid, is eligible for public mental health services as long as those services are medically necessary. Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition

The Headway Coalition is a vibrant group of community members that strive to achieve population level reduction in youth substance use in rural Newaygo County. The coalition's action teams operate from yearly action plans to address priority areas using community level data and the coalition's strategic plan. The Headway Coalition has recently been involved in topics regarding new drug trends,

harm reduction, school based prevention, and successful marketing campaigns designed to address low perception of risk among youth and parents. Central Michigan District Health Department Promoting Healthy Families, Healthy Communities

Central Michigan District Health Department runs the Exchange Central Syringe Service Program which is a safe and confidential program that makes sterile syringes accessible to those who use drugs. Their program aligns with an evidence-based public health service shown to reduce the spread of HIV and Hepatitis C. They also offer a place to connect with other resources

for needs such as treatment, testing, overdose prevention, and medication. CMDHD does not require any information from people in need other than a first name and phone number, just to allow for a form of communication. CMDHD is specifically trained to counsel, educate, and test for HIV and Hepatitis C by using 20 minute rapid testing. They are also phlebotomy trained to perform conventional blood draws. They have a full STD clinic where they can test and treat for other STDs right at their health department, as well as a PrEP clinic, and a clinic for those living with HIV. They have two full-time staff members who are state certified disease intervention specialists who assist linkage for treatment and resources for those positive and for partners of those positive for HIV or syphilis. They are currently in the process of making their services mobile to increase accessibility!



The mission of CREW is to provide students in recovery from or impacted by substance use disorders with a safe and supportive environment in which to achieve their academic, personal and

non-profit organization committed to serving our

Exchange Central is a judgement free location for residents from ALL counties to receive new syringes and works and dispose of used ones, free of charge. Participants of the program may receive syringe packets even if they don't bring in used ones, but we encourage that they bring them in to be disposed of properly. We also have other resources available to participants utilizing Exchange Central such as STI/HIV Testing,
